Your Four Year Plan

Year One

Get acquainted with the English faculty. Complete the Composition sequence (ENGL A101 and ENGL A102) and work on General Education requirements. Join a club or organization. Get involved with the campus community.

Year Two

In the fall complete introductory course (ENGL A275 Introduction to Literary Criticism) and at least one lower division survey requirement (for example, ENGL A284 or ENGL A288). This is a good time to take a foreign language and/or a lab science. In the spring complete at least one more lower division Survey Requirement (for example, ENGL A285 or ENGL A289), and begin taking upper division writing workshops (for example, ENGL A345 for Professional Writing, ENGL A466 for Creative Writing) and other upper level requirements. This is a good time to finish up the foreign language requirement and start on a minor or cognate.

Year Three

In the fall complete at least one lower division survey requirement (for example, ENGL A284 or ENGL A288) and at least one more upper division major requirement (for example, a Major Authors course). Continue working on General Education requirements. In the spring complete any remaining lower division Survey Requirements and continue taking upper division major requirements. Continue to make headway on the minor or cognate, and complete the Writing Proficiency Portfolio.

Year Four

In the fall complete the Senior Thesis (ENGL A496) and at least one more upper division major requirement in Area I-VI. Fill the remainder of your schedule with minor/cognate courses and any remaining general education courses. In the spring complete any remaining upper division major requirements and all remaining minor/cognate and General Education requirements. The editing and publishing internship may be completed in either fall or spring.
