Science	Plant bean seeds in plastic bags with a wet paper towel and hang in window. Plant bean seeds in cups using soil and place on windowsill. Write a hypothesis on which of the 2 will grow the best. Use journals to write daily on their observations of the 2 plants.		Use the engineering design process to construct a structure you think can withstand the wolf. (problem, research, develop possible solutions, select best solution, construct a prototype, test and evaluate, communicate findings, redesign) Use a small fan to test each structure then revise and test again. Communicate their findings by writing why their design worked or why it didn't and how they changed it.
Other	Art – use a variety of different types of seeds to create a seed mosaic.	Art – design a shoe that Cinderella would wear to the ball.
